


WELCOME

Childhood Memories - Chapter 3 John Folker

To fit one's childhood into a couple pages in our local magazine, it's impossible. So, I must skip playing in my beloved brook, wellies constantly full of water, wandering the woods and fields, butterflies, birds, and bees. Playing cowboys and Indians, bats and balls, dinky toys, model boats and aeroplanes, marbles, building dens, rounders, skipping and hopscotch. Hide and seek especially winter evenings when dark by 4:30. Building Sleds, and push go carts, bows & arrow and even catapults. These things are all too endless to go there but maybe broached in another chapter.

However, I now realise that I must have been something of a ringleader as so many old school pals have told me whatever I done the rest attempted to follow. Climbing trees was a typical example, the village was full of tall elm trees, and I wanted to climb all of them. I can remember always having to show others the way up, most failing to follow. Mum knew I was adventurous but did not want to kerb my discovery instinct, but she later told how she would not look up when I called her "hello" from the top of a tree fearing for my safety.

Wally was now accepted as part of the household. I was regularly going to the farm with him, feeding the pigs, milking the cows, riding on the tractor and horse & cart. Enjoying every new adventure. I remember Mr Cashmore was the first in the village to have a combine harvester, very basic compared with the modern version but to a young mechanically minded boy a wonders machine.

1952/1953 - Two eventful years. King George VI had died, and daughter Elizabeth was now Queen I can remember the very day the news broke. We kids soon caught on to the phrase "the King is dead long live the Queen" We had no idea how ungracious the phrase must have sounded as we kept repeating it around the village. We did not fully understand the significance of this event.


Some weeks later Mum & I were invited to the opening of the RAF memorial at Runnymede this commemorates all RAF members that lost their lives during World War 2. We attended and the new Queen performed the opening ceremony, then walked along the rows of the audience. This is a lovely location high above the banks of the river Thames two or three miles down stream from Windsor, also there, is the Magna Carta and Kennedy memorial.

The next eventful thing that year was me taking the eleven plus examination to try and gain a place at Towcester Grammar School, Mum & family were very keen for me to do well and keep up with Dad's brothers and sisters' families. Come the day of results, I and a girl in the village were declared both border line results. So, we had to attend an interview with the headmaster of the school. Much to mum and family disappointment Janice got the one remaining position and I was to go along with the rest of my classmates to Deanshanger Secondary Modern School.

My family did not know at the time, but it would turn out to be a blessing in disguise.

WICKEN PARK



Wicken Park, on the edge of our village off Wicken Park Road, was formerly one of the lodges of the Whittlewood Forest, sold in 1716 to Charles Hosier who enlarged it. The house came into the Prowse family through the marriage of Thomas Prowse of Axbridge, Somerset, to Elizabeth Sharp, eldest daughter of the Hosiers only child Anna Maria. Their descendants lived there until 1860 when it was sold to Colonel the Hon. George Sholto Douglas-Pennent, later Baron Penrhyn, who

enlarged the house and restored and enlarged the church in memory of his first wife who died 1869. The Penrhyn family lived at Wicken Park until 1944 when the estate was sold to the Society of Merchant Venturers of Bristol.

It is now the Nursery and Junior School campus for Akeley Wood School, an independent day school for children aged 1 - 18 and has been, and still is, attended by numerous children from our village.
